April Gardening Tips from Pike Family Nurseries

Spring is here! Hear the birds singing, feel the temperatures warming, and see the fresh green leaves of spring! This time of year is perfect for gardening. Enjoy the pleasures of planting colorful annuals, scrumptious vegetables and spring blooming shrubs.

*Watch for Chickweed in your lawn and garden. Spray it with a broadleaf herbicide such as Green Light Wipe-Out.

*Now is the time to control whiteflies on Gardenias. Young whiteflies are easy to kill with a spray of insecticidal soap or horticultural oil.

*Have your shrubs like Forsythia, Azaleas and Rhododendrons finished blooming? If so, prune them now before they set buds for next year.

*Fertilize your summer blooming bulbs such as Cannas, Dahlias and Daylilies now.

*Add color to your garden with warm season annuals. For

shady areas, choose Impatiens, Begonias or Coleus. For sunny spots choose Vinca, Marigolds, Geraniums, Salvia and Petunias.

*If your Bermuda and Zoysia grass is 50% green, fertilize with Pike's Atlanta Turf Special.

*It is time to spray for lacebugs on your Azaleas. Use Safer Insecticidal Soap.

*Now is the time to prepare new vegetable beds using planting soil, manure, and soil conditioner. Then plant all those delectable vegetables and herbs!

*Fertilize Fescue lawns with Pike's Atlanta Turf Special.

*Now is a great time to plant container grown trees and shrubs. Be sure to water these new plants weekly this summer.

*Roses should be sprayed every two weeks using Green Light Fung-Away fungicide to control black spot disease on leaves.

SPECIAL TOPICS

WHY DO DOGS BARK?

Dogs bark to express their emotions. It could be that they are anxious, bored, playful, hungry, or protecting their territory.

WHAT CAN I DO TO STOP MY DOG FROM BARKING?

First, figure out what's making your dog bark. Is he barking at people and cars? Is he barking at the neighbor's dog? Is he barking at noises outside? Is he barking at you while you're inside the house and he's outside? Does he bark at people who come to the front door?

Second, don't yell at your dog when he barks. When you yell at your dog, you may inadvertently be teaching your dog to bark. Think about it, most dogs just want attention. Even if you are yelling, the dog is still getting attention from you.

Third, think about changing your dog's environment.

- · Is your dog barking at the neighbor's dog? Rework the yard to deny him access to that side of the fence.
- · Is your dog bored while outside? Make sure he has plenty of bones and toys.
- · Is your dog barking at you while you're inside and he's outside? Bring him in the house and let him be with you.
- · Is your dog barking at noises outside? TV's and radios help to block out outside noises.
- Is your dog barking when left in the home alone? Make sure your dog has plenty of bones and toys. Before you leave your home, see that your dog has had physical, mental, and social activity. Exhausted and well fed dogs are less likely to bark while you are away.

Fourth, think of barking as a useful behavior at appropriate times. Some people do actually want their dogs to bark to alert them when someone comes into the yard or to the door. The problem is, most dog owners don't know how to teach their dog when it's actually okay to bark and when it should stop. Sometimes, all you have to do to teach your dog to be quiet is to teach your dog to bark on command. For example, while your dog is barking, uses a word like "speak" and praise your dog. Do this often and he will eventually realize what "speak" means. When your dog learns to bark on command, interrupt the barking with another command, such as "quiet" or "hush." As soon as he stops barking, praise and reward him.

Fifth, don't wait for the situation to arise. Don't wait for a visitor to knock on the front door, or for your dog to bark at another dog, or for your dog to bark when he is left alone. Set up training situations so you can practice teaching your dog to be "quiet" in certain situations.

What Is The City of Atlanta Doing To Improve the Sewer System and Protect Our Water Resources?


